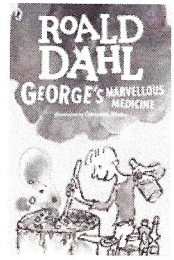

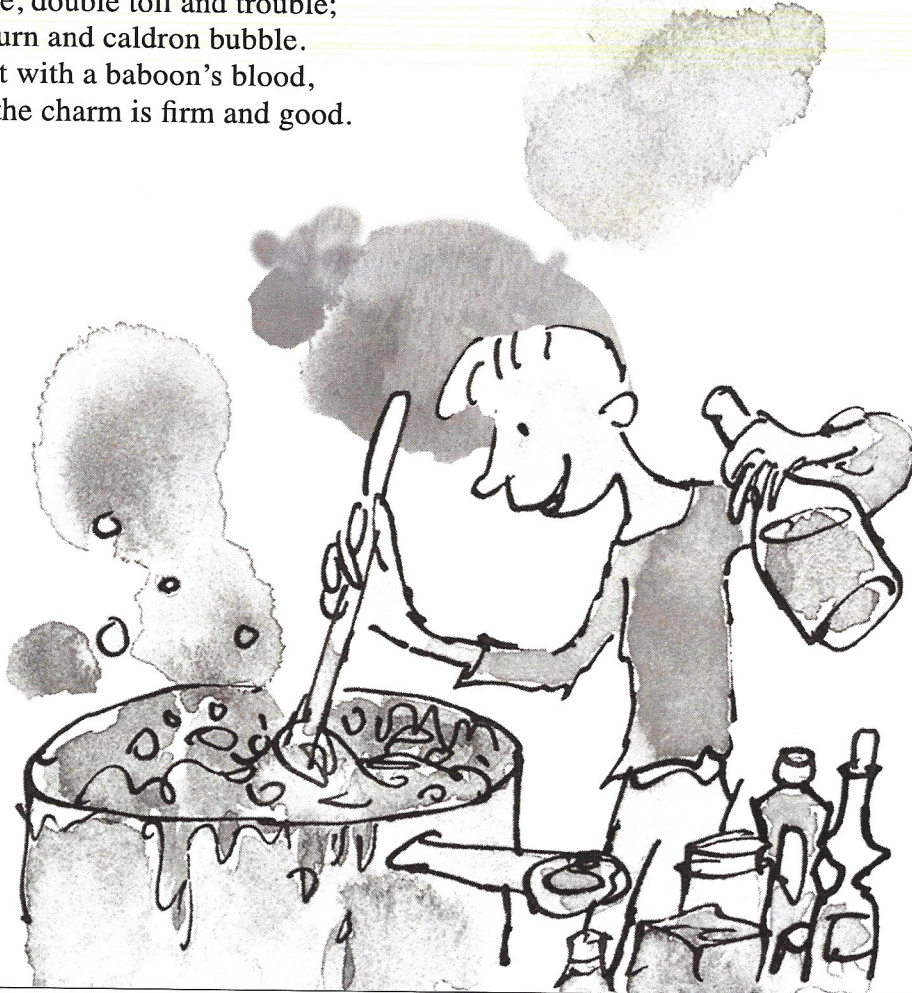


**EXTRACT TWO**

## Nouns

## Metaphors

Metaphors compare different things by suggesting that they are similar.

## Personification

Saying that non-living things have human qualities.
